Summary



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The Nissan Sentra Cup extended for the 2024 and 2025 seasons on Canadian tracks!

Alexandre Fortin winner of the races presented this weekend at the Grand Prix de Trois-Rivières

Launched on Canadian racetracks in 2021 following the success of the Nissan Micra Cup (2015 to 2020), the Nissan Sentra Cup will be extended for two more seasons, in 2024 and 2025. The announcement of this news came as positive surprise for drivers, fans of the brand and Canadian motorsport world and was made this weekend during the Grand Prix de Trois-Rivières, where two races of the series were held. The former saw the victory of Alexandre Fortin on both Saturday and Sunday.

By extending the three-season program to the years 2024 and 2025, Nissan Canada and JD Promotion & Compétition, the series promoter, reaffirm their commitment to Canadian motorsport and allow fans to benefit from the spectacle of the popular series for two more

seasons. With the Nissan Micra Cup that was launched on the tracks in 2015, it will be a full decade (11 seasons) that will have seen Nissan Canada sponsor a series in Canadian motorsport, which constitutes an unprecedented involvement in the country for a Road racing series.

This highly contested 2023 season also confirms the success of the series. "I am very happy to confirm our involvement for the 2024 and 2025 seasons with the Nissan Sentra Cup. In addition to the interest of drivers and fans of the Nissan brand, what is particularly exceptional is that the Nissan Sentra Cup continues to attract new racing enthusiasts and customers of our brand. We witnessed this last month with the first ever Nissan Grand Prix at the Complexe ICAR; and this weekend at the Grand Prix de Trois-Rivières, it was a pleasure to see all these spectators in the grandstands and in our paddocks to follow the series," said Steve Milette, President of Nissan Canada Inc.



The Series' promoter Jacques Deshaies, confirms: "Since the launch of the Nissan Micra Cup in 2015, we have allowed dozens of new drivers to taste the pleasure of motorsport by evolving with almost street cars in a one-make championship where talent always comes above budget. I am very happy with this announcement and I am inviting drivers and fans to the tracks, via social media and on television, for the 2024 and 2025 seasons".

Before getting there, the 2023 season is obviously continuing and this weekend at the Grand Prix de Trois-Rivières, rounds 5 and 6 were presented. Two races with no less than 30 drivers entered, which marked the end of the first half of the season.

Qualified in pole position on Friday, Simon Charbonneau led all the laps of the first race on Saturday, except the last one! Taking advantage of a restart just one lap from the end, Alexandre Fortin surprised the championship leader at the first turn to take the lead and race to his second victory of the season. Charbonneau finished second, just ahead of Valérie Limoges, the defending series champion who battled for a podium spot throughout the 40-minute race.

Sylvain Ouellet, Stefan Gauthier, Nicolas Miron, André Lapointe, Paul Dargis, Marie-Soleil Labelle and Mathieu Miron complete the Top 10. In the Micra class, Frédéric Bernier crossed the finish line in first place, but was excluded from the results for using non-compliant tires. It was Nicolas Lévesque who was declared winner, ahead of Simon Vincent and Sean Scully.

Sunday, in front of full grandstands and a hot summer sun, the second race saw Charbonneau lead from the start, while remaining under pressure from Valérie Limoges then Alexandre Fortin. Contact between Charbonneau and Fortin then allowed Fortin to take the first position few turns later, while Simon Charbonneau fell to 8th place.

Alexandre Fortin won both races. 3rd Saturday, Valérie Limoges finished 2nd, ahead of Nicolas Barrette, Samuel Rowe, Daniel Fortin, Stefan Gauthier, Mathieu Miron, Simon Charbonneau, Nicolas Miron and Frédérick Chaput. In the Micra class, Simon Vincent clinched his very first career victory in the GP3R, ahead of Raphaël St-Pierre and Charles-Étienne Boucher.





First in Sentra for Stefan Gauthier

He competed in the Nissan Micra Cup during the 2016 and 2017 seasons, winning the rookie of the year title in 2016. General Manager of the Sorel-Tracy Nissan dealership, Stefan Gauthier was back on track and in the series during the Grand Prix de Trois-Rivières. But now, it's at the wheel of a Sentra! Apart from a slightly optimistic corner which saw him hit a track protection, Stefan had two very good races, finishing 5th then 6th. In qualifying, he was also 6th.



Very busy paddocks at the GP3R!

All spectators with a general admission ticket or given access to the grandstands were allowed to circulate free at the Grand Prix de Trois-Rivières. The Nissan Sentra Cup paddocks attracted the attention of thousands of fans. This 53rd edition of the GP3R was also experienced in the Nissan corporate lodge by several dozen guests from Nissan Canada for an event once again very successful and under the sun, apart from a brief storm on Friday between the free practice session and the qualification.

Nicolas Lévesque and Simon Vincent winners in the Micra class

If the fight at the front and in the Sentras peloton raised passions in the GP3R, both races were also very spectacular in the Micra class. In the first one, Frédéric Bernier made his winning comeback to the series. But, he had used tires not registered at tech scrutineering, as required by the Series' regulations, and he was excluded from the results, thus giving victory to the popular and very promising young driver from Trois-Rivières, Nicolas Lévesque. In the second race, Simon Vincent returned to victory after having successfully dueled with the 2022 class champion, Raphaël St-Pierre.





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Launched at the start of the 2021 season following the success achieved between 2015 and 2020 with the Micra Cup, the Nissan Sentra Cup will not stop after its third season, at the end of this year. It will be extended for the 2024 and 2025 seasons. A wonderful news shared by series promoter Jacques Deshaies. We met him at the Grand Prix de Trois-Rivières...

First of all, congratulations on this two-year extension for the Nissan Sentra Cup. What does Nissan's involvement since 2015 and the creation of the Nissan Micra Cup mean to you?

We started this adventure together, with Nissan Canada, for 3 years, with the option of another 3 years. But I didn't think it would go until 2025. 10 years, 11 seasons, that's unique for an automobile manufacturer in Canada. Nissan is the first manufacturer in Canada to have such a long uninterrupted involvement in Canadian road racing. We often talk about the ultrasporty makes and their programs around the world, but for us here in Canada, Nissan is the manufacturer that has given the biggest helping hand to motorsport and it is to their credit. I'm really happy about that and I now have to delay my retirement to continue to improve the series!

Are you going to keep the same rules for the next two seasons, and in particular the presence of the Micra class within the series?

Yes, we will keep both Sentra and Micra categories. As long as we have drivers registered in Micra class and they create action and competition on the track, we will keep this category. As for the regulations, with each new season, we work with our officials to improve them in order to finalize the rules. Next season will be the same and we may have some new points to add to this chapter. Our rulebook is always growing.

At the Complexe ICAR last July, the very first Nissan Grand Prix was a great success with thousands of customers and fans of the brand on site. Will this event return in 2024?

Given the huge popularity this event enjoyed this year and the fantastic response from people to Nissan's invitation, we can now confirm that there will be a second edition of the Nissan Grand Prix in 2024. Steps have been taken with the Complexe ICAR de Mirabel for the organization of the event. We have two possible dates at the moment, both in July.



Over the seasons, we have seen several karting drivers take an interest in road racing and more particularly in the Nissan Sentra Cup, which appears to be the best way to Canadian motorsport for many of them. Do you think there could be a partnership to come with the karting community and in particular for young drivers interested in the series?

This is one of our next goals! We may have neglected the karting environment in the past because we developed many other projects over time, but I would say that the link between our series and the drivers currently racing in karting is now one of our priorities. We want to go see young people, go to karting events, meet them and show them who we are and the many advantages that a series like the Nissan Sentra Cup can bring them in their motorsport future.
